

Fron Band-Aids to Bridges:

Moving Forward with Community Food Centres



Community Food Centres (CFCs) support action to strengthen local food systems and connect individuals and groups to opportunities within this sector. CFCs contribute to local economies by providing inspected kitchens for entrepreneurs to build their small businesses. CFCs can increase social capital by building connections and belonging, and reducing social insolation. They become a hub for food and community, creating youth programming, space for farmer's markets, food literacy training, and positive food policy.

Community Food Centres (CFCs) create inclusive space for:

Health

Being food insecure has profound impacts on physical, mental, and social well-being; and places a person at greater risk of becoming a high-cost user of the healthcare system.



A CFC can deliver programs to improve food literacy and bridge service gaps.

Social Justice



Canadians experience food insecurity. The CFC model empowers individuals to advocate for and strengthen their food system and food security.

Culture

Only 1 in 5 food insecure households access traditional food charities.







CFCs provide a space for everyone! They invite all to celebrate food and promote respect for diverse food cultures.

Education & Food Literacy

CFCs deliver food programming that improves community food literacy. These programs link food with the environment, health, and economics and can include: youth skills, agricultural celebrations, farmers markets, community gardens, the Good Food Box, community meals, and student nutrition programs.

Economic Development



In 2017, it cost \$203.61 per week to feed a reference family of four in Grey Bruce.

The cost of eating well continues to rise, but economic gains aren't distributed equitably across the food system. CFCs use economic development principles to develop connections between agri-business and consumers.



- 20% of HH food insecure (StatsCan)
- 21 Food Banks across 2 Counties
- Traditional charity model
- Rural, scattered population to serve
- No public transportation
- Not all Food Banks report to Feed Ontario Hunger Map
- Food Banks are largely run by volunteers



















Transitions







Community Food Conversations Objectives

- Strengthen network of food security stakeholders/service providers to move towards "hub" model
- C. Share regional initiatives: Food Rescue, Grey County AgriFood Asset Map, Grey Bruce Food Charter, Fall Food Gathering

- B. <u>Discuss</u> services, resource needs, service gaps, and whatever other issues are currently affecting attendees programs
- Take action identify a local action project that is a next step to food security (ie. cooking program, community garden upgrade, etc).


Challenges/Successes

- Core funding for Community Food Centres unsuccessful with low population density
- Bruce Grey Agri-Food Asset Map
 - Partnership with Grey County GIS. Initially a small, user friendly asset map showed only our data. This has now been merged with a larger regional map. https://maps.grey.ca/pages/agrifood
- Community Gardens/Community kitchens popular undertaking, lots of available green space and certified kitchens (churches)
- Food Security education ongoing
- Food waste diversion ongoing education on the need to do so balanced with ability to store and process food



Lessons Learned

- Moving towards a model takes **leadership** for change
- Ensure free technical support for Food Banks in transition is available for example, community gardening support.
- Bringing in Community Voices can be uncomfortable with Food Banks but changes the dynamics in the room
- Layer programming in community hubs for example, provide Bridges Out of Poverty training to Food Bank members and offer Getting Ahead in communities

Recommendations from a rural perspective

- Recognize the unique challenges in access faced by Canadians living in rural, remote, and Northern communities.
- An income response that reflects the housing and transportation challenge is necessary for food insecurity.
- Mandatory, consistent data collection on food insecurity using validated and reliable measures.
- The right to a healthy environment, food and water means sustaining natural food systems; protect access to wild food sources and country foods.
- Support healthier food environments in schools, food literacy and support viability of young farmers and food entrepreneurs.
