











Population Growth Rates, 1981–2021 Canada and the Five Tamarack Study Areas










Age Distribution of the Population, 2021 Canada and the Five Tamarack Study Areas










Household Living Arrangements, 2021 Canada and the Five Tamarack Study Areas











Household Size Distribution, 2021 Canada and the Five Tamarack Study Areas


















Households by Mortgage and Rent Subsidy Status, 2021 Canada and the Five Tamarack Study Areas








Educational Attainment, 2021 Canada and the Five Tamarack Study Areas












Low Income Rates After-Tax (LIM-AT), 2015 and 2020 Canada and the Five Tamarack Study Areas










Low Income Rates After-Tax by Sex and Age Group (LIM-AT) Canada and the Five Tamarack Study Areas, 2020










Income Sources by Share of Total Income, 2020 Canada and the Five Tamarack Study Areas



Occupational Structure of Employment, 2021 Canada and the Five Tamarack Study Areas Slative, Senior Management Business, Finance, Administration Sciences










Commuting Duration for the Employed Labour Force Canada and the Five Tamarack Study Areas, 2021










Ethno-Cultural Diversity, 2021 Canada and the Five Tamarack Study Areas














Racialized Population Share, 1996–2021 Canada and the Five Tamarack Study Areas


