Too often, evaluation is mysterious noise. We can't discern a beat we can tap our feet to. The melody we seek is elusive. Outcomes and traditional evaluation approaches were supposed to be, or help us create, the beautiful music we so desperately want to sing and listen to. But more often than not we are swimming in noise.

This survey instrument will ask for data that will serve as a baseline for your initiative and for us collectively as a network, in the following areas:

- Community Capacity Building
- Policy and Systems Changes
- Physical Assets: Emergency Supports, Housing, Transportation, Childcare....
- Social Assets: Civic participation, improved or increase social networks....
- Human Assets: Health, Literacy, Education, Employment skills....
- Financial Assets: Income, savings, and sources of financial security, including government income security. programs

Through a simple format survey, members will be asked to share stories from the field that are about significant change(s) that have taken place and that are connected to the work of the local VCC-CRP network.



The Evolution to Game Changers Emerging Design Questions...

- How can evaluation be sufficiently comprehensive while acknowledging time/capacity challenges?
- How can we focus evaluation efforts on what matters most?
- Is there a simpler way?
- How do we collect reliable and consistent data/info year to year?
- How do we evaluate poverty reduction with the long view in mind?
- How might we understand data and information as signals of progress?
- How do we evaluate to learn and adapt and inform future strategy and innovation?





What is a Poverty Reduction Game Changer?

A priority area or strategy that not only aims to deliver on its own specific goals or outcomes,

but also elicits an array of other significant, positive outcomes that cascade both within and outside of its area of emphasis,

and consequently profoundly impacts the course, character, or extent of poverty.





Features/Benefits of a VCC Network Game Changer Approach

Clarifies/advances Collective Impact Efforts.

- Helps articulate a common agenda and resultant strategies
- Facilitates Outcome Identification
- Clarifies Mutually Reinforcing Activities
- Focuses Communication
- Helps Identify Backbone Supports
- Leverages Complexity
- Frames Collaborative Leadership
- Helps focus re: Community
 Engagement

- Enhances Capacity Management
- Emphasizes Progress over Proof
- Moves from Attribution to Contribution
- Signals Policy/Systems, Political Reform
- Contributes to Movement Building
- Focuses Learning/Adaptation on Big Change.
- Can influence funding and research priorities
- Enhances Communication as a Network















Access to safe, secure, adequate, affordable, and suitable housing is fundamental to living a decent life, and can help people escape poverty, experience less unemployment, and participate fully in their communities.

Once people find stable housing, they can focus on other important areas of their lives, such as education and employment, and can build strong futures for their children.







Possible Game Changer Indicators

- Formal Plans at work (governments, communities)
- Policy and Systems Change (e.g. mix of market and social housing in new developments)
- Housing Stock by Type (e.g., shelter, transition, supportive, special needs, social housing, subsidized housing, market housing)
- Rental and Utility Cost
- Homeless Count
- Wait lists for subsidized housing
- Zoning, bylaw changes that facilitate affordable housing development
- Rent Banks, Eviction Intervention Programs





Some Go-Forward Challenges/Issues

- Identifying Game-Changers: rationale, progress indicators....
- Design that fits a diverse VCC membership
- Clear communication with members as well as other key stakeholders (e.g. major funders).
- Balancing consistency with the iterative nature of a new/innovative approach.
- Maximizing the collection of reliable, defensible data/information.
- Connecting Game-Changers, not silo them.
