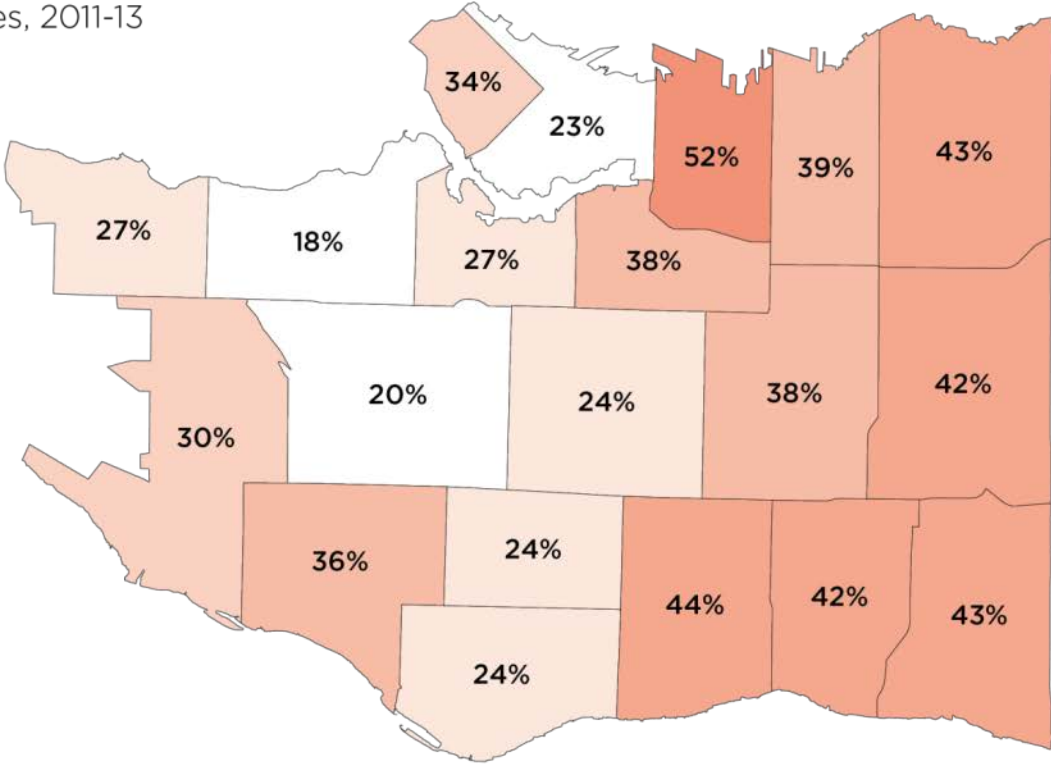
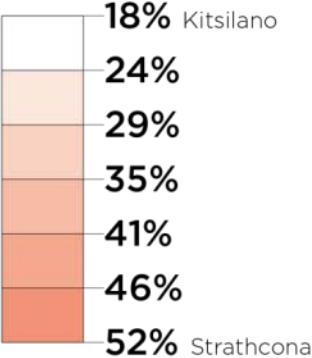

35% Vancouver children entering kindergarten with vulnerabilities on one or more EDI scales, 2011-13

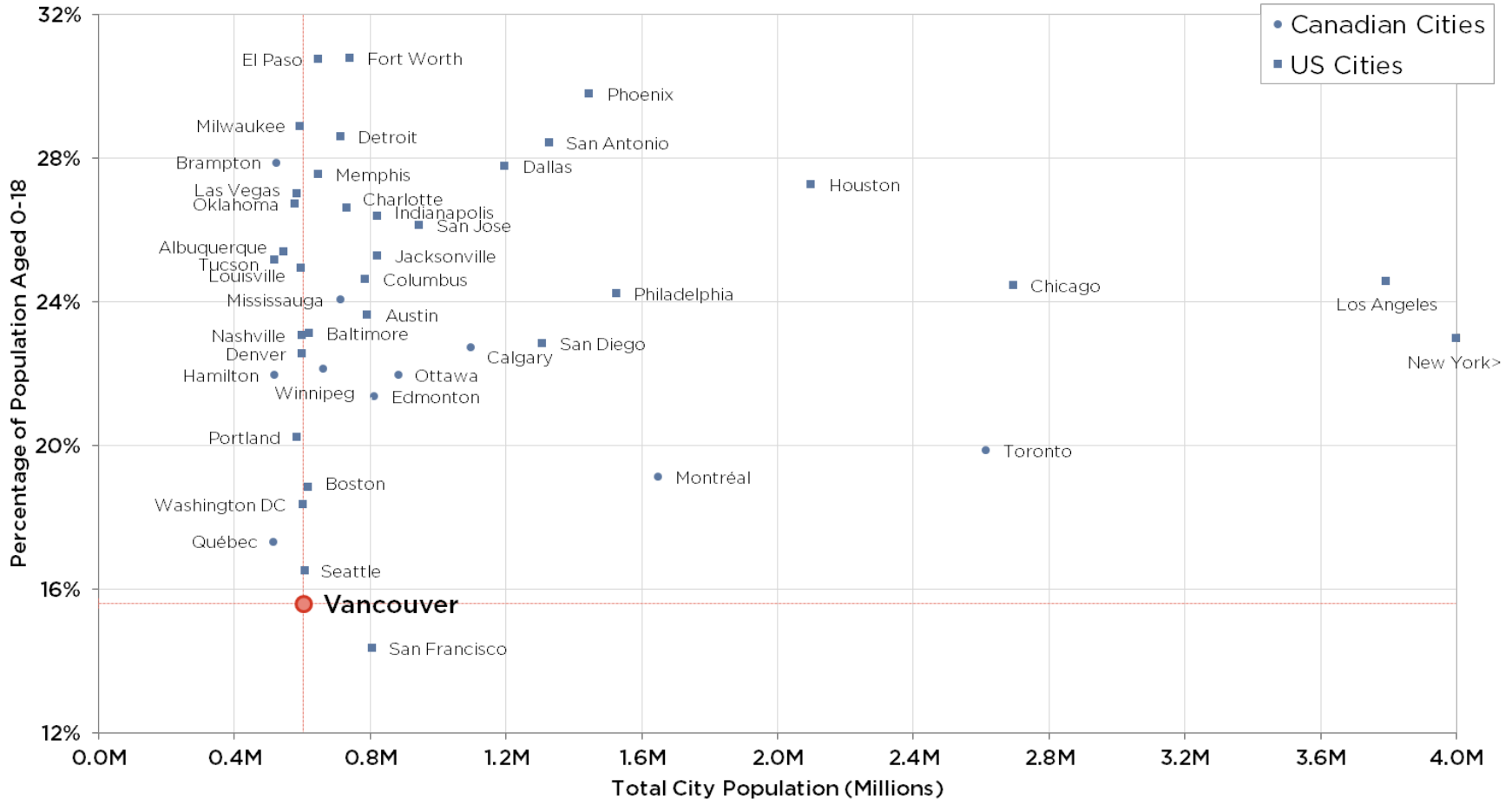

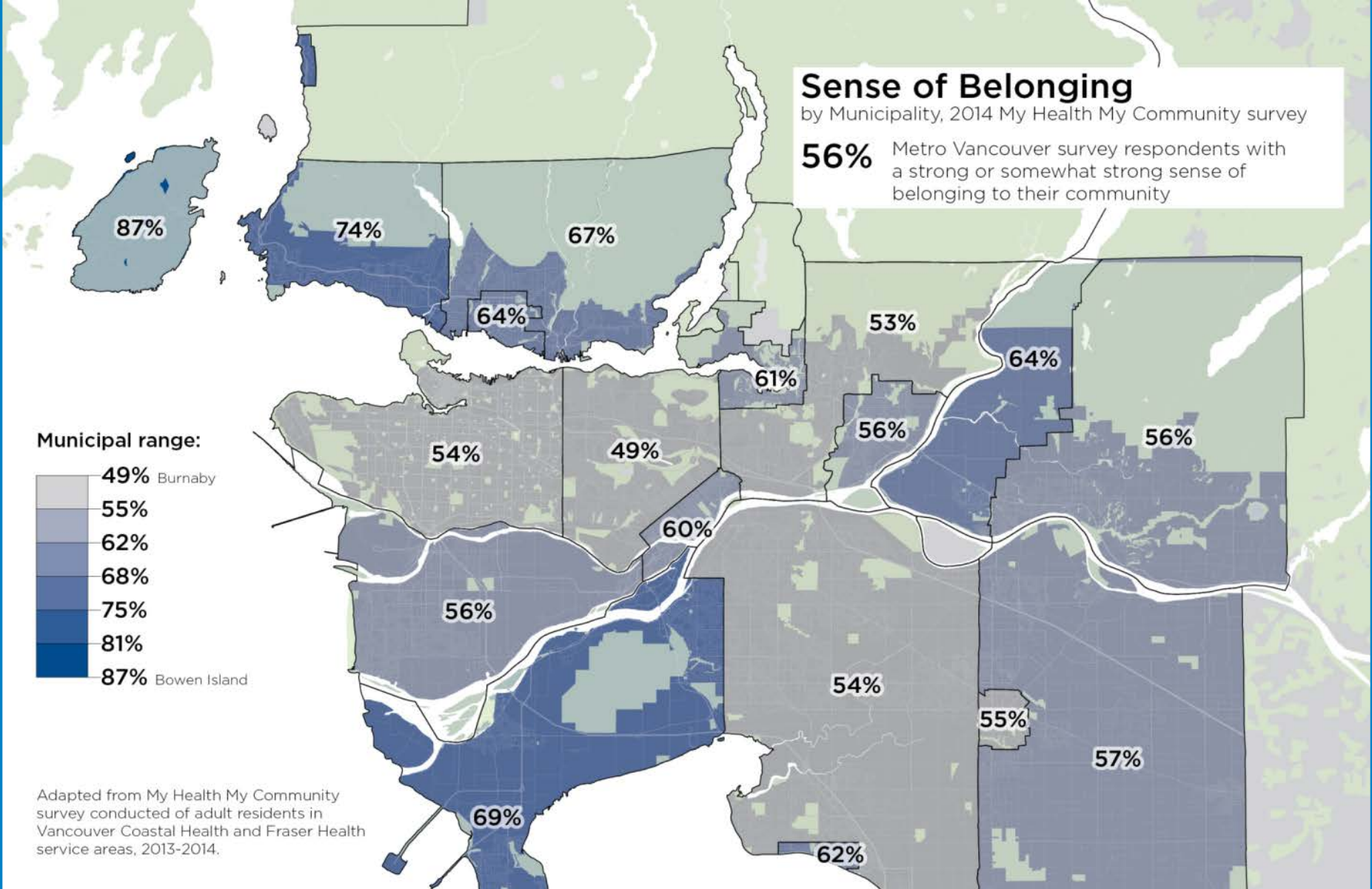
Child Population - Canada and US Cities

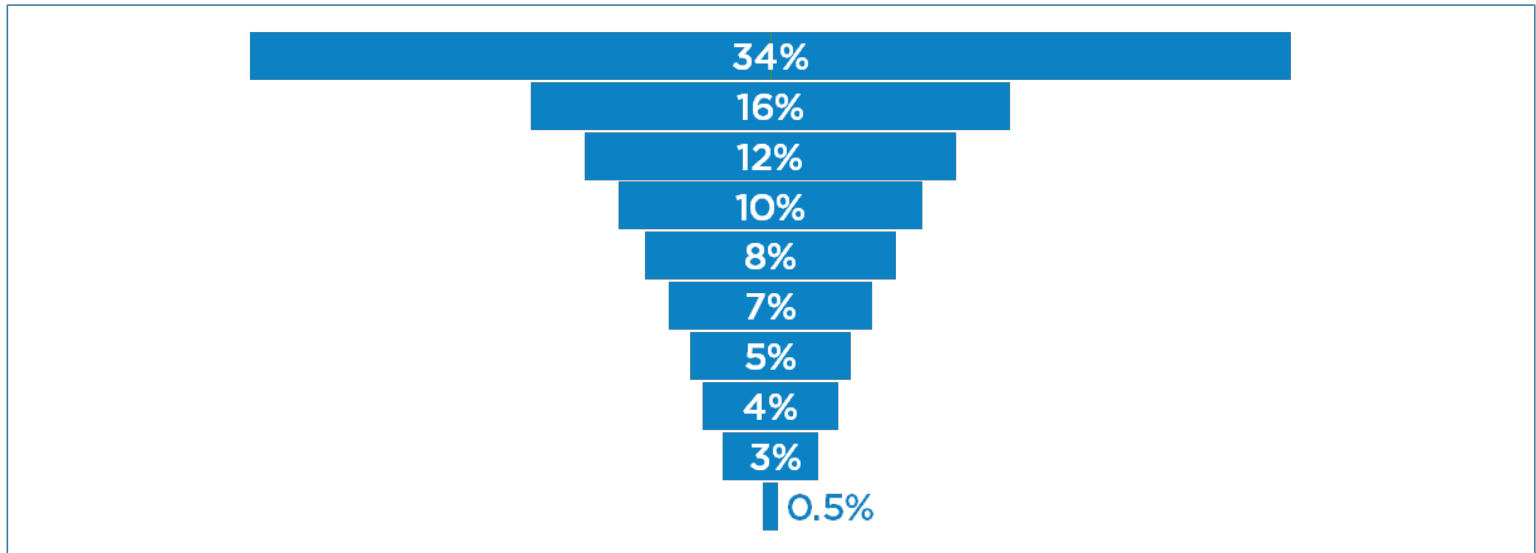

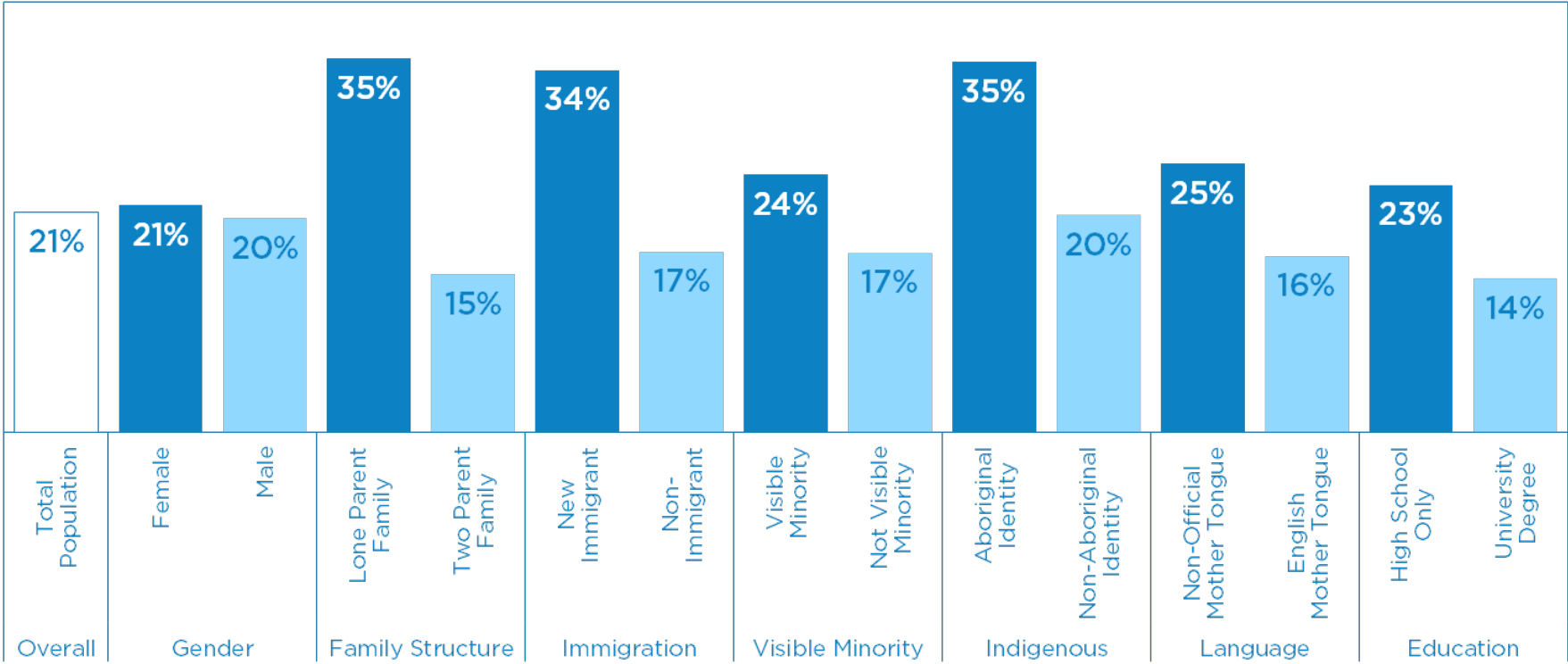

Percentage of Persons Below After-Tax Low Income Measure



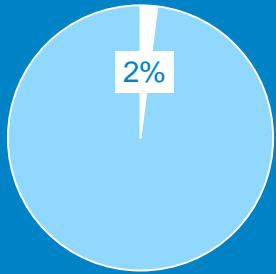

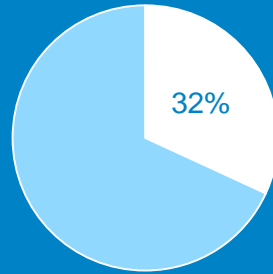

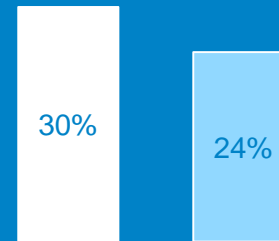

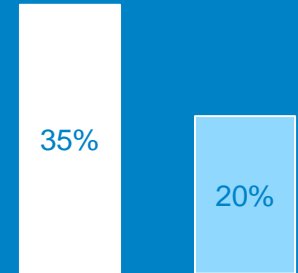

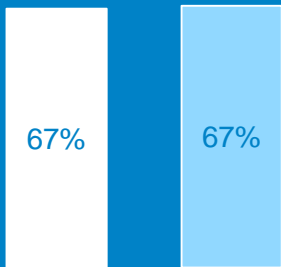

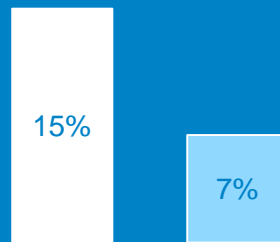

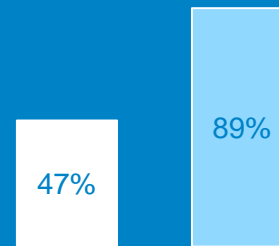

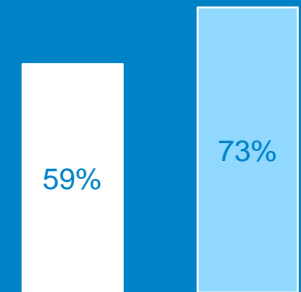

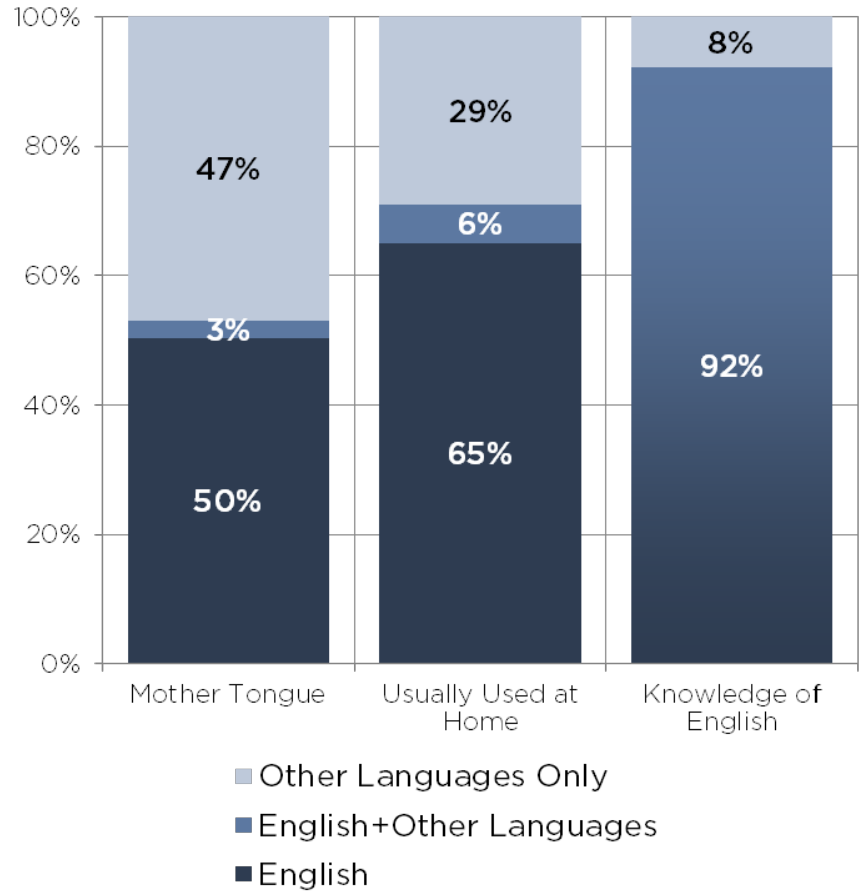

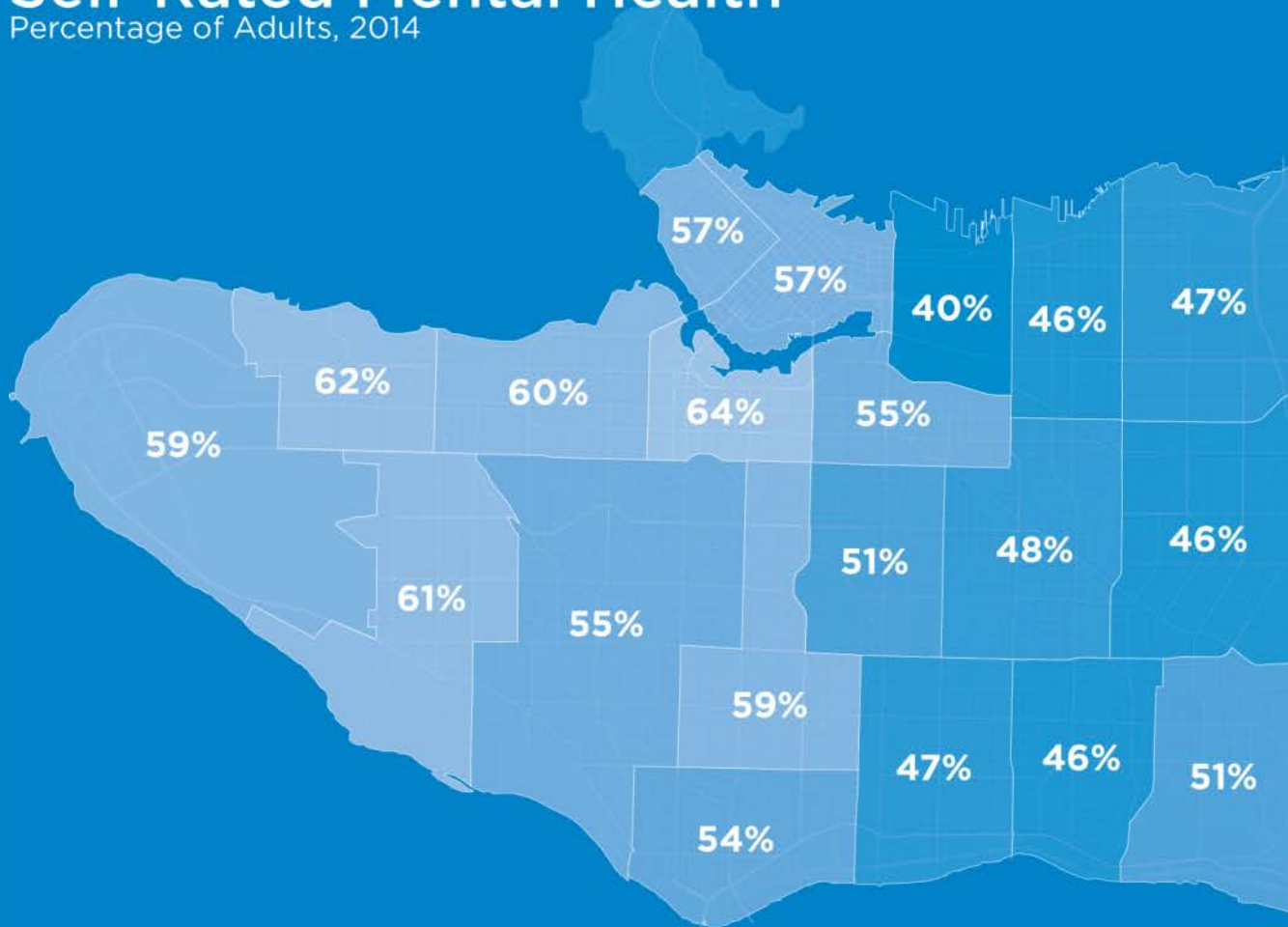

Percentage of persons aged 18+ reporting very good or excellent mental health:

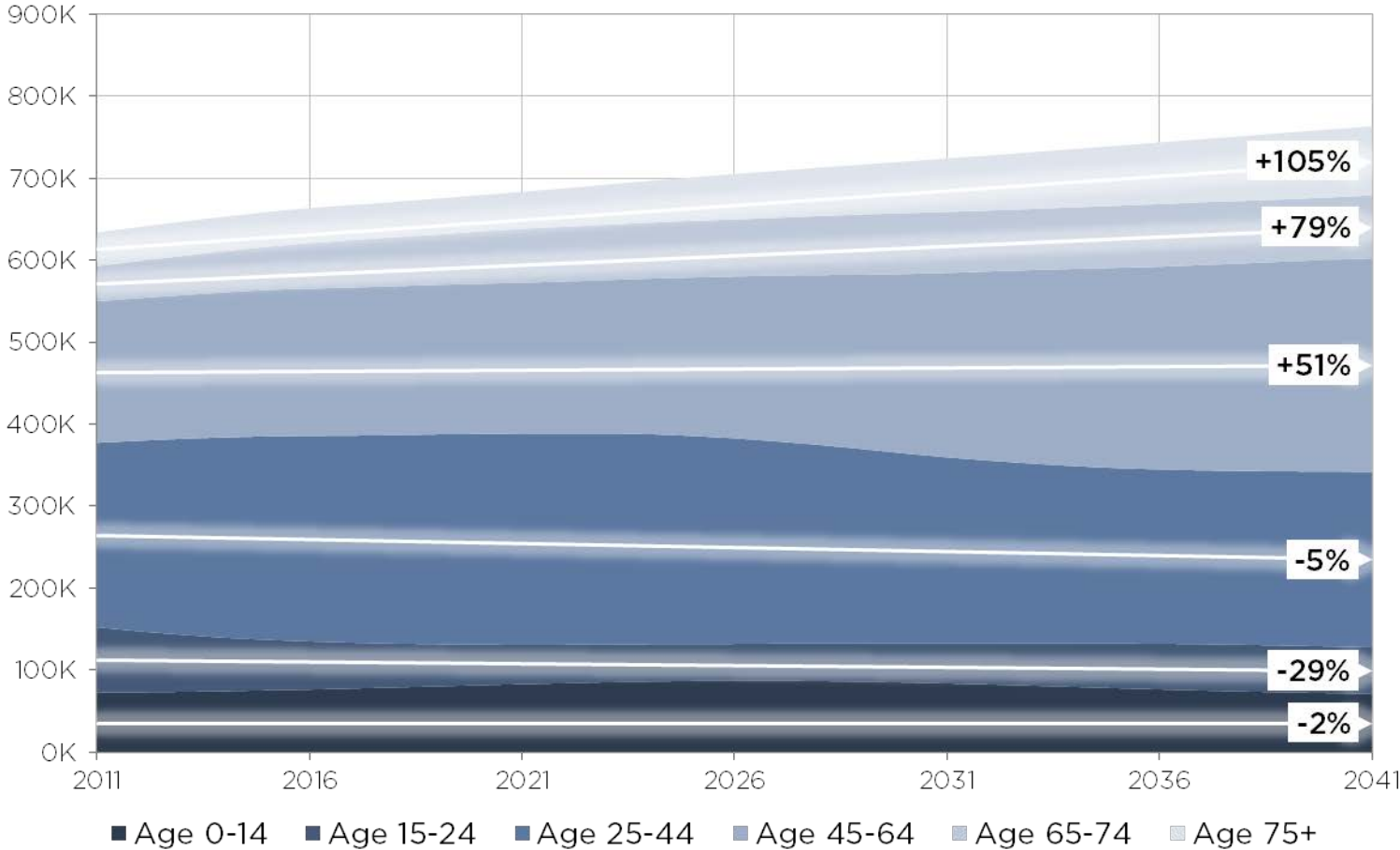
