

What is Climate Equity ?

Impacts of climate breakdown are mounting quickly and may soon outpace humanity's ability to adapt.

Communities most vulnerable to climate impacts are also the least to blame.

TACES Pilot #1

Saanich E-Bike Incentive Program

Informed by, and developed in collaboration with, the District of Saanich, the Community Social Planning Council of Greater Victoria (CSPC) and UBC REACT Lab

Four Steps

Embed Equity from the beginning

Reinforce equity regularly

Make the project local

Evaluate results and measure equity and intersectionality



TACES Pilot #1

Saanich E-Bike Incentive Program

To ensure equity in the distribution of rebates for the purchase of e-bikes, 2 key tools were developed:

Tiered rebate levels linked to household income and size (rebate: \$350, \$800, \$1600)

Income testing that respected individual's right to privacy


Saanich E-Bike Incentive Program

Results for \$1600 incentive level

101 participants

Average price of E-bikes purchased was \$2,566.34.
On average, the incentive of \$1600 covers 62% of the average e-bike purchased

In 2021, the population of women in the District of Saanich was 51% and 49% or men




TACES Pilot #1

Saanich E-Bike Incentive Program

Results for \$1600 incentive level

Seventy three percent of the participants were aged 36 and above




TACES Pilot #1

Saanich E-Bike Incentive Program

Results for \$1600 incentive level

In 2016 about 3% of the population of the District of Saanich was Indigenous, 20% visible minority, and 21% immigrants (at this point the proportion of LGBTQ2S+ and people with disabilities is not known).




TACES Pilot #1

Saanich E-Bike Incentive Program

Results for \$1600 incentive level

In 2016, transportation mode: 68% personal vehicle, 6% walking, 12% public transit; 1.5% used an e-bike and 1.5% used other mode of transportation.




CRD Cycling Gender Gap Project



On average women make up only **29% of adult cyclists** using regional trails in the Capital Regional District.


Women **choose not to cycle** for various and complex reasons tied up with issues of **gender and safety**.

Thematic Distribution from Group Rides on Regional Trails

Notes were taken during two group rides along regional trails in the Capital Regional District (CRD) in August 2022. Notes were coded and major themes of why women choose not to bike were identified. This preliminary research is being used to develop methods and approach for the next stage of research and solutions workshopping.


