The Topic/Issue

Covid-19 has changed the way we look at the importance of Community. Months of social isolation and loneliness has made us realize that we can not live a healthy and fulfilling life without a strong community and support system.

Working with the Tamarack Institute this summer, I decided to explore their model of community development: Asset-Based Community Development.

Certain groups and communities have suffered the most due to social isolation and lack of community. Immigrants, marginalised and racizlaised groups etc. Throughout my report I have used an approach of using democratised language so that this report can be used my community members and leaders and not just for academia.





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The 7 areas of Impact

We explored the working of ABCD through seven areas of impact: (1) Sense of belonging (2) Equity and Inclusion (3) Civic Engagement (enabling care / acting together) (4) Strengthen Resilience (5) Community Safety (6) Community Health / Wellness (7) Empowered Local Economies

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KEY QUESTIONS:

- Who does not have a seat at the table?

- How can we increase peoples participation in ABCD?
- How can we make ABCD more inclusive
- What can be done to gain most amount of traction and results through the areas of impact.
- How can the areas of impact translate into policy recommendations







Findings

- There is a lack of immigrant perspective in the discourse surrounding ABCD.
- The health and well being of a community is dependant on that communities ability to form social connections and combat social isolation.
- Many communities practice ABCD without knowing it. They need government and organisational formal support.
- Governments need to take input from residents to build better cities and communities



Small Community led inititaives can lead to real change

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Inclusive Community parks Food security - Neighbourhood vegetable gardens and breakfast kitchens Increased funding for community projects Use of social media to garner youth interest in ABCD Making sidewalks pedestrian friendly



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Recommendations



Representation is paramount for the practice of ABCD, and Community Development in general, to be equitable.



Outreach and garnering interest and awareness in the cause of community building is an issue that needs to be tackled using innovative ideas. To increase said engagement, the interests and grievances of all communities, especially immigrant communities, need to be catered to by the government and Canadianborn folks.


